# A Word from the Director of Music

Once again, the Advent season welcomes us with warm hearts and gentle spirits. I would like to welcome you to Trinity Presbyterian Church's presentation of Joseph Martin's A Celebration of Carols. This particular collection of carols was carefully selected by the composer in a recreation of the story of the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Some of the earliest Christmas carols were sung in Europe thousands of years ago. However, at that time they were actually considered pagan songs sung at the Winter Solstice celebrations. The word carol means dance or song of praise and joy! Early Christians took over the pagan solstice celebrations for Christmas and gave people Christian songs to sing instead of pagan. In AD 129, a Roman Bishop declared that a song called 'Angel's Hymn' should be sung at a Christmas service in Rome. Soon after this many composers all over Europe started writing carols.

Prior to the popularity of singing carols in public were 'official' carol singers known as 'Waits.' These were groups of people led by important local leaders who had absolute power within the towns to take money from the public. They were referred to as 'Waits' because they only sang on Christmas Eve when the Christmas celebrations began. Presently, over two million carols have been written, are sung during various church services and are utilized through the custom of 'Caroling' in the streets.

Joseph Martin's cantata fuses together a medley of familiar tunes such as O Come, All Ye Faithful, O Little Town of Bethlehem, Angels We Have Heard on High and Joy to the World, along with some not so familiar carols such as Sing We Now of Christmas, Carol of the Birds, Il Est Ne, Sussex Carol, Still, Still, Still and Rocking Carol. Martin has skillfully utilized carols from a variety of time periods and origins to create a unified celebration of the Advent season.

As we take an inward look at the wonderful things that God has given us throughout the year I invite you to celebrate those thoughts and feelings through the musical tidings presented by the choir this evening. From seasonal songs that lift our spirits to the peaceful carols in retrospect of past times, this great collection of music resonates through the warmth of God's grace. It is with great pleasure that I present to you the Trinity Presbyterian Church Choir, joined by some of Tulsa's finest musicians, in our presentation of A Celebration of Carols!

### GUEST MUSICIAN BIOGRAPHIES

Erik Michael Collins, Director of Music, is a graduate of Oklahoma State University where he received his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration and Marketing Management. In addition to serving as Director of Music and Pianist for Trinity Presbyterian Church in Bixby, Erik is currently an Account Manager at Spherexx Software Development Company. He is also the co-founder and former co-director of Capriccio Vocal Ensemble. Erik spent two summers at the Royal School of Church Music, studying the history and theory of sacred music with former American Boychoir director, Dr. James Litton.

Over the past several years, Erik has remained active in the community as an accompanist for several Tulsa, Claremore and Broken Arrow area schools, OSSAA district and state-level contests, the Tulsa Public Schools All-District Children's Choir Festival and multiple years for the regional Oklahoma Music Educators Association (OMEA) Choral Music Festival. In July 2013, Erik served as the guest choral clinician for the Southwestern UU Summer Conference in Hulbert, OK.

Erik received the distinct honor upon reception of the Oklahoma State Department of Education for the Arts Award, for both piano and vocal performance in 2008. He is an active member of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, collegiate member of the National Association for Music Education, and the American Choral Directors Association. Erik also serves on the Executive Board of Directors for the Tulsa Boy Singers.

Julia Harris, violinist, holds a B.S.E. in Music from the University of Arkansas and a Masters Degree in Gifted Education from the University of Tulsa. She has been a Suzuki-approach teacher for over 25 years and currently teaches violin, viola, Celtic fiddle and hammered dulcimer privately in Tulsa and surrounding areas. Julia played in the Tulsa Philharmonic Orchestra from 1974 until its close in 2002. Currently, she is a professional violinist in the Tulsa Signature and Bartlesville Symphonies.

Kim Clark, violinist, received her BME with an emphasis in K-12 instrumental music from Evangel University in Springfield, a Masters of Education in Secondary Administration from William Woods University and a MA in Religious Studies from Missouri State University. Jean-Paul Barjon, cellist, is a 2011 TU graduate and began his cello career with the "Young Strings" program at the age of six in his hometown, Dallas, TX. He was a member of the Greater Dallas Youth Orchestra for six years. In 2007, he became a music major at the University of Tulsa, under the teaching of Diane Bucchianeri. As a TU student, Jean-Paul played with the Tulsa Signature and Bartlesville Symphonies, Dave & the Wavetones Band, and the TU Orchestra, where he was the principal cellist for three straight years. He also has traveled across the country for cello performances to places like New Mexico, Illinois, Kansas, New Hampshire, and the Peabody Institute in Baltimore, where he gave a world premiere of a cello and piano sonata by American composer Douglas Buchanan. Lisa Wagner, oboist, is a native of Southern California. She received her B.M. in Oboe Performance from the University of Southern California, and her M.M. from the University of Colorado in Boulder. Lisa and her husband Rick moved to Tulsa from Boulder to play in the Tulsa Philharmonic. Currently, Lisa plays oboe professionally in Tulsa while teaching Elementary Music at Eisenhower International School. Lisa has been an employee of TPS for 20 years. In addition to teaching Elementary School she has been a teacher of Middle School Band and Choir. Lisa received her Orff levels from Marilyn Wood, Konnie Saliba, and Yos Wuytack. Lisa's Husband Rick Wagner conducts the Tulsa Youth Symphony and is orchestra director at the University of Tulsa.

Benjamin Perrault, percussionist, started playing drums at an early age. In high school he played with the Booker T. Washington Jazz Band under the direction of James Kirk. He has played drums for several groups including rock bands, one of which recorded on the John Lennon Educational Tour Bus. He has studied extensively with local drummers Jeff Porter, Brian Cupp, Josh Massad and Josh Raymer. Ben is a senior at the University of Tulsa majoring in International Business and Spanish.

Kent Dennis, pianist, Kent Dennis is a native Oklahoman, having grown up in Ponca City and Bartlesville. He began studying piano at a young age, and started the violin a couple years after. He began working in church music at the age of 12, serving as a keyboard player in his childhood congregation. One of the highlights of his youth was performing as soloist with the Bartlesville Symphony, playing Beethoven's 3rd piano concerto in his orchestral debut. Another was filling the role of concertmaster with the Oklahoma All-State Orchestra, playing as a soloist in the concert. Following high school, he moved to Tulsa, where he attended the University of Tulsa and studied piano performance under Dr. Roger Price, also studying violin with Maureen O'Boyle. While there, he served as concertmaster of the university symphony, accompanied the university's choirs, and had the opportunity to appear again as a soloist, this time with the TU orchestra. He also began teaching privately during the latter part of college, which has carried over into the present. Following his departure from TU, he became the music director for the Tulsa Project Theatre, the community's only equity theatre company; took over as the director of music ministries at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church; began accompanying choirs at both Cascia Hall and Holland Hall; became a member of the Tulsa Signature Symphony, the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas, the Tulsa Symphony, and the Bartlesville Symphony; and continued teaching a full studio of students at the Barthelmes Conservatory. He has also recently delved into singing, performing with the Council Oak Men's Chorale the past 2 seasons, as well as studying privately with Dorothy Stone and taking intensive master classes in her studio in NYC.
