"Therefore prepare your minds for action; discipline yourselves; set all your hope on the grace that Jesus Christ will bring you when he is revealed." -1 Peter 1:13

Advent has been celebrated by the church since at least 480. Some claim that the apostles themselves celebrated advent. Though its form and length have changed over the years, it is a time set aside for us to prepare for the coming of Christ. Advent comes from the Latin word "adventus," which means "arrival" or "approach." This was a translation of the Greek word "parousia," which literally means "presence," "arrival," or "official visit." It was used outside of the Christian world to talk about the visit of a king or an emperor. This regal arrival would inspire robust celebrations and fanfare. In the Bible and in the church, we use this word to refer to Christ returning in judgment and ushering in the kingdom of heaven – certainly a much bigger deal than a diplomatic visit by an earthly ruler.

So, Advent is about much, much more than just getting ready for Christmas Day and meditating on the itty bitty, adorable, precious, sweet, little baby Jesus. Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, born in 1090, was a monk for forty years.

From the Pastor's Pen, Cont'd:

Over the course of his life, he was an abbot, confessor, and doctor of the church. In a book of homilies for the season of Advent, he urged us to consider three comings of Christ.

First, Christ came in flesh as a baby in Bethlehem. Second, we should remember that Christ comes into our hearts daily. Third, we eagerly await the coming of Christ in glory at the end of time.


If we look at Christ in this way, we can see that at the first coming, those physically present could see Jesus, whether they believed or not. In the third coming, all humanity will see the pure salvation of the Lord. But this middle coming, when Christ comes to our hearts day by day, that is hidden. Jesus chooses to come to us and we can see him working and growing in our own hearts. With each new arrival into our hearts, we can feel ourselves being saved in his love and tender mercy. Bernard writes, "The middle coming is like a road that leads from the first coming to the last. At the first, Christ was our redemption; at the last, he will become manifest as our life; but in this middle way he is our rest and our consolation."

My friends, Advent is not just about Christmas Day. Advent is our lifelong challenge. Can we see all the ways that Christ comes into the world? Are we living like those who have hope? Do we stand firm on the promises of God in this life and the next? May this season of preparation make our hearts ready for any task that Christ calls us to and may we be living messengers of hope, peace, joy, and love each day of our lives.

is just around the corner! Dec. 17th at 10:30 am



# Trinity presents Joseph Martin's Appalachian Winter

Once again, the Advent season welcomes us with warm hearts and gentle spirits. I would like to welcome you to Trinity Presbyterian Church's presentation of Joseph Martin's *Appalachian Winter*. This particular collection of music was carefully selected by the composer in a recreation of the story of the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

At the coming of winter there is a blessed quietness that seems to settle upon the heart. The chill of frosty air and the season's lengthening shadows invite us to reflection and simplicity. As we retreat to the hearth and away from the cold, there is a subtle turning that seems to happen. Weary from struggle and frozen by distress, we find warmth and assurance inside our sanctuaries of contemplation. Peace falls like a gentle snow and we remember, with great hope, the promises of our faith. The candles of hope, peace, love and joy are once again kindled in our spirits. We gaze with longing into the silent night, seeking a star and listening for a song that will fill the deep silence and set our hearts to celebration.

It is then, above the whistle of the winter wind, the first notes of a distant Gloria arrives. Soft at first, it comes like a dream, and then in a great crescendo, it sweeps across our emptiness and fills our hearts with a symphony of angel wings. The mountains and canyons echo like cathedrals declaring the news: "Jesus the Savior is born. Glory to God in the Highest."

Overflowing with worship and surrounded by grace, we discover our miracle. Melody and message reach out and draw us close into their lavish embrace. Rejoicing, and filled with wonder, we join the music, lifting our praise into night. How amazing that in the very heart of winter's desolation, we have found our Song.

Composed in the spirit of folk music, Joseph Martin's cantata combines traditional sounds with more rustic elements creating a blend that is fresh and pleasing. Popular American carols such as Away In a Manger and O Little Town of Bethlehem dance with traditional spirituals such as Children, Go Where I Send Thee and Go, Tell It on the Mountain. Sacred Harp tunes are re-tooled for Advent and stand alongside new versions of Shaker hymns and Appalachian melodies. Thoughtful narration weaves the movements together in a meaningful tapestry of song and Scripture.

This sixty-minute work is filled with joyful songs of the season as well as introspective readings between each movement. The evening will close with a reflective piece entitled "Peace, Peace," in which the congregation will sing the familiar Silent Night in collaboration with the choir's part. As we take an inward look at the wonderful things that God has given us throughout the year, I invite you to celebrate those thoughts and feelings through the musical tidings presented by the choir this evening. From seasonal songs that lift our spirits to the peaceful carols in retrospect of past times, this great collection of music resonates through the warmth of God's grace. It is with great pleasure that I present to you the Trinity Presbyterian Church Choir, joined by some of Tulsa's finest musicians, in our presentation of *Appalachian Winter* on **Sunday evening, December 10th, at 7 P.M.**
