From the Pastor's Pen

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"You know quite well that the day of the Lord's return will come unexpectedly, like a thief in the night... and you won't be surprised when the day of the Lord arrives. For you are all children of the light and of the day; we don't belong to darkness and night.... Let us who live in the light be clearheaded, protected by the armor of faith and love, and wearing as our helmet the hope of our salvation.... So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you are already doing."

Each Advent, we spend time lighting candles, remembering hope, peace, joy and love. It's like we're storing up these treasures of faith, taking them out of the drawer for a little while, making sure that we still

know their purpose. Sure, it's easy for our treasures to get a little dusty during the ordinary time, but it's important to remember where we kept them for all those months.

When we light the advent candles, we're recognizing more than the barest concept that they represent. Indeed, we're shining that light for others to see, a beacon in the darkness against the shadows of challenge that the world brings. And, yes, those shadows loom large in this time of year, when all the shiny advertisements remind us that we're not perfect without product x or service y.

Honestly, I think the image of these shadows was best captured by J.K. Rowling, in her Harry Potter series. She describes Dementors, which are shaped like dark cloaks floating around, wraith-like, generating feelings of depression and despair in any person nearby. Now, in the books, one can help stave them off by eating chocolate, just as certain foods or experiences can hold depression at bay for a time. But it takes a concerted effort to drive them off for good.

Well, in Advent, we are expectantly waiting for a rebirth – and part of that waiting involves a concerted effort to prepare the way. After all, a single candle may not seem like much, but it holds a lot of hope. Whenever the power goes out, that hope is realized in a startling way – suddenly, that candle, lost at the back of a drawer, or in a ceramic enclosure, or even in the camping supplies from that trip you took months ago – that hope becomes real. Even when you'd forgotten about it for a time.


That's the power of the advent candles – to stand up against the Dementors of all of our lives and hold up the light of God to the world. Because, Jesus tells us, one day we won't need to hold up the candles any more. Instead, we'll be constantly in the presence of God's light – indeed, we will be called "children of light," for we will shine with God's light, too. Hope, peace, joy, and love will radiate from all on earth.

And that's worth remembering – celebrating – and even waiting for.

A CELEBRATION OF LESSONS & CAROLS

Sunday, December 9, 2018 - 10:30 AM

The **Celebration of Lessons and Carols** is a format for a service of Christian worship celebrating the birth of Jesus that is traditionally followed at Christmas. The story of the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus is told in nine short Bible readings from Genesis, the prophetic books and the Gospels, interspersed with the singing of Christmas carols, hymns and choir music.

The format was based on an Order drawn up by Edward White Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury but at that time Bishop of Truro, in Cornwall, for use on Christmas Eve in 1880. Tradition says that he organized a 10 pm service on Christmas Eve in a temporary wooden shed serving as his cathedral and that a key purpose of the service was to keep men out of pubs on Christmas Eve.

The original liturgy has since been adapted and used by other churches all over the world. Lessons and Carols most often occur in Anglican churches, but also in some Roman Catholic, Lutheran parishes, and Presbyterian institutions. However numerous Christian churches have adopted this service, or a variation on this service, as part of their Christmas celebrations. In the UK, the service has become the standard format for schools' Christmas carol services.

The best-known version is broadcast annually from King's College, Cambridge, on Christmas Eve. It features carols sung by the famous Choir of King's College, Cambridge. Groton School of Groton, Massachusetts, has performed the festival longer than any institution other than King's, holding its first Lessons and Carols in 1928. On **Sunday, December 9**, the Trinity Choir will present its biennial service of Lessons and Carols. This year's sacred repertoire will consist of our traditional processional, *Personent Hodie*, along with the music of John Rutter, Norman Luboff, and Philip Kern. Notes and history on the selection of choral carol anthems can be found below.

Personent Hodie is a festival procession that is often associated with the Feast of the Holy Innocents. The origin of the text is difficult to trace but there are Latin sources with the text that date during the 12th century and German sources from the 14th century. The first printing occurred in 1582 from the source "Piae Cantiones," a collection of medieval Latin songs that was intended for pupils of cathedral schools. The stately carol begins with youthful voices singing and praising Jesus who was brought forth from a virgin. The second stanza features the women telling of how Jesus was born wrapped in swaddling cloths and placed in a manger in a stable of beasts. The men majestically sing about the wise men bearing gifts in the third stanza and how they came bearing gifts of gold, incense and myrrh. The carol ends with the Gloria in excelsis Deo! (Glory to God in the highest).

In the Bleak Midwinter is a Christmas carol based on a poem by the English poet Christina Rossetti. The poem was published, under the title "A Christmas Carol", in January of 1872. In verse one, Rossetti describes the physical circumstances of the Incarnation in Bethlehem. In verse two, Rossetti contrasts Christ's first and second coming. The third verse dwells on Christ's birth and describes the simple surroundings, in a humble stable and watched by beasts of burden. Rossetti achieves another contrast in the fourth verse, this time between the incorporeal angels attendant at Christ's birth with Mary's ability to render Jesus physical affection. The final verse shifts the description to a more introspective thought process.

Still, Still is an Austrian Christmas carol and lullaby. The melody is a folk tune (authorship unknown) from the State of Salzburg, appearing for the first time in an 1865 folk song collection. The words, which run to six verses in German, describe the peace of the infant Jesus and his mother as the baby is sung to sleep. The words have changed slightly over the years but the modern Standard German version remains

attributed to Georg Götsch (1895–1956). Lyrics for the English version were written by award-winning American lyricists and songwriters Alan Bergman and Marilyn Bergman. Norman Luboff compiled the 4-part choral arrangement for the song in 1958.

Angel's Carol eagerly draws us in with a bright undercurrent supplied by a flowing piano accompaniment and spacious melody. Throughout its duration, we hear the questions: Have we heard the sound? Have we seen the star? Have we heard the news? The answer Rutter provides comes from an outburst from the angels, themselves: "Gloria in excelsis Deo!" ("Glory to God in the highest!") while highlighting historic themes of the season, including peace, love, light, and hope.

God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen is an English traditional Christmas carol. It is in the Roxburghe Collection (iii. 452), and is listed as no. 394 in the Roud Folk Song Index. It is also known as Tidings of Comfort and Joy, and by variant incipits as God Rest Ye, Merry Christians or God Rest You Merry People All. It is one of the oldest extant carols, dated to the 16th century or earlier. The earliest known printed edition of the carol is in a broadsheet dated to c. 1760. The traditional English melody is in the minor mode; the earliest printed edition of the melody appears to be in a parody, in the 1829 Facetiae of William Hone. It had been traditional and associated with the carol since at least the mid-18th century, when it was recorded by James Nares under the title "The old Christmas Carol". Philip Kern gives a fresh approach to this time-honored melody with a steady piano accompaniment and modal transitions.

The congregational carol and hymns on this Lessons & Carols Sunday will include traditional familiar selections, such as *Once In Royal David's City, O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, Lo, How a Rose E're Blooming, Hark! The Herald Angels Sing, We Three Kings of Orient Are,* and many more. You won't want to miss it!
