And that's why I found this passage from James so striking: "Think of the various tests you encounter as occasions for joy." Joy? Steadfastness, sure. Tenacity, great. But joy?! "C'mon, James," you might have heard me say out loud while reading, "You're asking too much. I'll get through this, but I'm not going to like it."

But then... then I remembered the joy I've always found in learning new things. In honing old skills. In finding new ways to look at the world. Yes, we're stuck in isolation, mostly inside, but this is an excellent time to reflect. If I can get past thinking of this as a trial, trying to do everything I've always done, I can indeed find the joy waiting behind, that's been there all along.

One of the things I've needed to refresh quickly is how cameras work, so that our worship recording can go well. Yet, while working on the video side, I've found new joy in experimenting with still photography, taking pictures of the world as it is, and looking back later at the images to see details I missed in the first place. I'm no pro, but there's joy in capturing good images, in seeing the world through the eyes of a photographer – it's like reveling in creation all over again.

Have you ever noticed blurry points of light in the background of photos? As a kid, I occasionally called these "spirit orbs," since I saw them in my pictures most often when shooting in the dark with a flash – it felt spooky to me. Now, I've learned that this pleasant blurring of background light sources is called "bokeh," and its shape is determined by the aperture opening in the camera. Basically, it's an image of the inside of the camera, repeated wherever the out-of-focus light is strongest in the photo.

To me, this resonated with the idea of God's presence. God is always with us, even when we're focusing on the world around us, God's creation. In the bokeh, we see that we are all made of the light of God, an image of our inside that we couldn't have seen at the moment, since our focus was on something else, but God's light was with us nevertheless. Perhaps... Holy Spirit orbs?

So, the next time you see a photo with pleasant bokeh, may you remember God's presence with you. May you find the good gifts of God, the joy that underlies even the darkest of times, knowing that we will endure together, growing in wisdom and faith.

All Things COVID-19

Hello! The session has been hard at work creating a re-entry plan. We have lots of information to provide you, but all of the information in this section is still pending session approval, so it could change! If session approves the following, phase one of re-entry will begin May 17th and will go through June 14th. Session will meet prior to the 14th to determine if we should continue with phase one or transition into phase two.

Who can enter the church building?

Starting May 17th, we will allow groups of 10 people or less to enter the building. We ask that if you feel sick or have had a fever 48 hours before entry, that you stay home. We also ask that vulnerable individuals (60+ and those with underlying conditions) stay home during phase one. We want to keep everyone as healthy as possible, so those who still want to attend the groups will be able to through zoom. During phase one, we ask that children remain at home. This was a hard decision, but again, we want to ensure everyone's safety! Child based activities will be put on the church website and on the Facebook page, so look forward to those!

Where do I enter the building?

During phase one, please enter the building through the front doors. During normal business hours, the front doors will remain locked to help us follow the protocols. Ring the doorbell if you do not have a key!

What do I need to do once I'm in the building?

Please read the protocol sheets taped to the doors, they will provide reminders and helpful facts!


You will need to wear a mask at all times while in the building. If you do not have one, cloth and disposable masks will be available inside the front doors.

We will have sanitation stations located inside the front door, outside the bathrooms, and near your meeting location. We are also looking into installing foot door openers on the bathroom doors, but until then, there will be a sanitation station outside the bathroom.

Social Distancing guidelines are still expected to help keep everyone safe.

Pray


