From the Pastor's Pen



What has been, will be again; what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun. ~ Ecclesiastes 1:9

Five hundred years ago, on October 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted ninety-five statements to the door of the Wittenberg Castle Church (Now called All Saints Cathedral). This marked the beginning of the Protestant Reformation – the sweeping changes that would lead to three distinct Protestant movements – Lutheran, Reformed, and Anabaptist – and prompt a Counter-Reformation in the Catholic church (which adopted many of the changes that Luther had originally suggested!)

But Luther's reformation wasn't the first – nor the last – change the Church would see. Just a few decades earlier, a Union was proposed – and nearly implemented – between the Roman Catholic church and the Orthodox churches. The Council of Florence, over the course of a decade, had managed to secure support from all the Patriarchs of the churches, and word was spreading that the break between Orthodox and Catholic was nearly at an end.

Bishops poured into Florence from all around the known world. Imagine the surprise of the council, then, when two new Bishops showed up, from a place that had entered into legend: Ethiopia!

Ethiopia was an early region to convert to Christianity, starting in the 4th century. Two Greek-speaking Christian boys were captured and taken as slaves to the King of Aksum. Since they could read and write in Greek, they were made tutors to the royal family, and secretly taught the royal children about Christ. Both boys were freed on becoming adults, and were ordained – one as a priest in Tyre, and the other as Bishop to Ethiopia. Bishop Frumentius was later called "Revealer of Light" and "Abba Salama – Father of Peace" in Ethiopia for his work in spreading the Gospel, and translating the Bible into Ethiopian, even inventing a new way of writing to do so. Truly, being able to articulate your faith from an early age is important!

Four hundred years later, almost all contact between Ethiopia and Europe was cut off by the Muslim conversion of North Africa. Occasional delegations could make it through – either through luck, or purpose – but mostly, Ethiopia was on its own, remaining the only Christian nation in Africa after the Muslim conversion. Legends began to circulate in Europe around the 12th century about a distant Eastern King who ruled a Christian nation beset by non-Christians on all sides, yet who was able to maintain an exotic and magnificent kingdom by the power of God.

This king was thought to also be a priest, and so his name became known as Presbyter Johannes, "Presbyter" meaning elder or priest. Over time, this was corrupted to Prester John, and the search for his mythical kingdom was a major focus in Medieval Europe. When contact was regained between Europe and Ethiopia, the first delegation from Ethiopia had a man named Johannes as its leader, and the Europeans started to connect the stories with Ethiopia, instead of the Indian subcontinent, which had been searched to no avail. At the Council of Florence, the Ethiopian contingent was surprised that the Europeans insisted on referring to their Emperor as Prester John. Despite their insistence that "Prester John" wasn't one of the official regal names of Emperor Zara Yaqob, it stuck.

Sadly, the decision of the Council of Florence to unite the Catholic and Orthodox churches did not stick. After the death of an Orthodox patriarch who had signed the document, his replacement repudiated the union – and without full support, it fell through, shattering completely when Constantinople fell to the Ottoman Empire in 1453.

All of this may seem to be just a historical footnote, as forgotten as the legend of Prester John, or the Empire of Ethiopia in the middle ages. Yet, as Ecclesiastes reminds us, there is nothing new under the sun. Perhaps one day, the body of Christ – the Church – will recognize its inherent unity, despite time and distance. In the meanwhile, we will be, as we have been – "the Church Reformed and always being reformed."




Finance/Stewardship randy smith
