From the Pastor's Pen

"Living Beyond Fear"

I think it's a mercy that we don't remember too much of our very young childhoods – when anything that goes remotely wrong could send us into a total, unstoppable meltdown. Of course, this is not a mercy that parents are spared. Indeed, there are countless posts online where parents share their frustrations under the title, "reasons why my kids are crying." Usually they include pictures of despairing children with headings like: "she's not allowed to eat batteries," "the slide was too slow," "I won't let her slap me in the face with my phone," "we are going to play at the park," and "I wouldn't give him a bite of raw chicken while I was making dinner."

When we're upset about something, big or small, sometimes we're just not very good at making peace with it. We want to make it happen, make it work – do something, anything to make it better. As we grow up, we learn to stop throwing tantrums, but that uneasiness when something isn't right just stays with us.

In Isaiah 30, the people of Israel are facing a big problem. The Assyrian empire has been growing and expanding and now Assyria has turned its sights on Israel. In a panic, Israel sends a delegation down to Egypt to make an alliance, to come under the Pharaoh's protection. The problem is

- they didn't seek God's counsel. They didn't pray about it or listen to the prophets' guidance. Instead of looking to God for protection and salvation first, they went to the strength of another nation, the supposed power of other gods.

Israel felt out of control and so they took control by going down to Egypt (which, in this case, did not work out well for them). With the pandemic, the violence and conflicts, the wildfires and storms, and everything else going on right now, I think a lot of us feel out of control, too. Like Israel, we want a simple, straight forward fix – something that we can see and hear and touch that rushes in right away to save the day. Here, though, we can hear God speaking into our time as well. Very few of us are medical researchers and epidemiologists, legislators and first responders, or others with the technical skills or positions of authority to make a huge dent in the problems we are facing. The little things that we do matter: wearing masks, living in love, helping our neighbor – but they don't give us ultimate control over any of it.


God reminds us that we are not in control, but that does not mean that everything is falling apart. God is still God and while we live in this anguished, in-between time, we need to remember to reach out to God, to trust in God to carry us through. We need to return – to turn away from our panic-based choices and repent of our delusions of control. We can rest because we have faith that God is still working. Our instinct might be to lose it, to worry endlessly, to give up on a brighter tomorrow, yet we look to God for stillness and calm. God is our refuge – our only refuge – and we have time right now to remember that we are in a safe harbor in God's loving hands. Our strength doesn't come from our money or power, our worries or anger, our isolation or apathy. No, our courage and our triumph come to us in that we trust in God.

Take a deep breath. Feel all the places where you are holding tension – where you have taken the weight of the world on yourself. Notice every thought that criticizes your own earnest efforts or lashes out at others. See your own impatience and worry and exhale slowly. You will not solve everything today and neither will anyone else. Inhale – exhale. God is still God. God is with you in the stillness – you don't need to be the storm. Let it go. Inhale – exhale. God is still God, Christ is with you, and the Spirit flows through all creation. "In returning and rest you shall be saved; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength." We are going to be okay. Amen.




Banners in the Sanctuary

I have been blessed to notice the banners chosen by our pastors to show up in our on-line worship. They have added an important visual punch to these presentations.

Our Administrative Assistant, Kim Harvey, and I are working on some small informational messages to hang beside each of them. You will have seen that there are six banners. Each one of them represents a purpose of the church and these purposes come from our "Book of Order."

Until these explanations are ready, I will share these purposes with you:



The first banner is "The proclamation of the Gospel for the salvation of humankind" On the banner, the book represents the scriptures from which a dove arises. This indicates the source of both the original witness and the present understanding. The same spirit that inspired the original writers enables us to receive the gospel. The cross behind the book and the dove reminds us the heart of the Gospel is Jesus Christ, God with us and for us.

The second banner is "The shelter, nurture and spiritual fellowship of the children of God," has multi-hued hands representing all of the children of God. The dove's wings are tipped downward, sheltering the people of God. The triangle of light links the dove to the people.

The third banner is "The maintenance of divine worship." The chalice, a reminder of the trinity, represents the Lord's Supper while the three drops of water represent baptism in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The dove reminds us that the same Spirit is present in these sacraments as in the proclamation of the gospel. The sacraments enact the gospel. The raised arms signify our response of praise and thanksgiving ~ our worship of the living God.

The fourth banner is "The preservation of the truth." This banner represents the light of truth shining in the darkness. The dove reminds us that the truth we proclaim to the world is the gospel of Jesus Christ, God with us and for us. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

The fifth banner is "The promotion of social righteousness." This banner represents Amos 5:24, "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever flowing stream."

The sixth and final banner is "Exhibiting the Kingdom of Heaven to the World." The dove is in flight over the earth, carrying an olive branch, echoing Genesis 6:11: 'And lo, in her mouth a freshly plucked olive leaf,' so Noah knew that the waters had subsided from the earth." This represents the eighth day of creation, God's grace coming into the world, the reign of God proclaimed by Jesus Christ. The light rising behind the earth represents the dawning of God's kingdom.

My thanks to all those who worked on the banners that carry such important messages. Some of us did sewing, some painted on them. Some people helped who don't sew. All contributed.

Yes, as you have read this item, you have now read an excerpt from our "Book of Order" Not necessarily what we all esteem to do.

Trinity Family:

After a continuing decline of new COVID-19 cases in Tulsa County, the Session has voted to allow Phase 3 (in-person worship inside the church)! As such, we continue with in-person worship services on Sunday mornings at 10:30 a.m.!

These services will be modeled on the prayer services we've been holding outdoors - there will be assigned seating from ushers, masks will be required, and there will not be vocal music for the time being. Children and youth are welcome to worship in the sanctuary, and very young children are welcome to play outside on the playground with adult supervision (provided), though there will not be indoor Sunday school at this time.

Online worship will continue as well, for those who are not yet able to return to in-person worship. Virtual Sunday School will continue at 9:15 as it has all Summer long.

Trinity's Session has also put into place contingency plans for future spikes in cases. If the 7-day average of new cases trends upwards, we will move the service outside, following the outside protocol (phase 2.5) until it is safe to move inside again.

Career




Personal
