From the Pastors' Pens

In the Presbyterian Church (USA), the process of calling a new pastor is something akin to *online dating*.

After all, the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) fills out an online form, touting the best aspects of the church, and the potential pastors fill out their own set of forms that show their best theological and pastoral selves. Then, the PNC is sent matches from the computer matching service, and decides to hear sermons, interview, and eventually, meet with various candidates in person.

Finally, a pastor – or in this case, pastors! – show up at your church. And it's all smiles and hugs and greetings, but everyone is secretly wondering, "Are these people the right fit? Is this pastoral relationship thing going to work out?"

Also, there's a lot of food. Meals and conversation go together perfectly in this "getting to know you" stage.

Which is good! After all, Jesus ate with all sorts of people, many of whom he met for the first time that day! At least we have the assurance that the PNC and the Pastors approve of each other. So, let's get to know each other! Give us a call, email, or text, and Elana and I will be happy to meet with you one-on-one (or two-by-two, for that matter!)

Later this month, Elana and I will be presiding over the communion table with you for the first time. We'll be breaking bread, joining with you at the heavenly banquet, and remembering Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. But we'll also be *re-membering* the Body of Christ. When I finished social work school, a classmate (Sheena) and I went on a road trip around the country. Over the course of 6 weeks, we went from North Carolina to Georgia to the Gulf of Mexico to the West Coast to Vancouver to Minneapolis and through Nashville on the way back home. Since I had already been out of high school and college for a number of years, my friends and former classmates were strewn about the nation. We found them and crashed on their couches – renewing old acquaintances and meeting the people and the places that presently graced their lives. It was the first and only time in my life that I travelled for that long or to that many places in such a comparatively short time. We were excited to explore the country – neither of us had ever seen a desert or a rainforest (yes, we have some in Oregon!). In the midst of our enthusiasm, one thing became clear quickly – with all the ground we planned to cover, we would be constantly saying goodbye. Practically as soon as we began to thrill in a new city or new friends, we would be leaving them behind, possibly forever. But then a funny thing happened. Maybe it was the energy and openness that colored our travels; maybe it was our constant focus on the present – but pretty early on we realized that we weren't just constantly saying goodbye. We were also constantly saying hello – constantly arriving in a new place with a completely different experience and more people and things to discover.

As many of you know, my Grandmother died on August 21st and I attended her funeral in Maryland. In prayer and meditation, my mind has gravitated to this passage from Revelation about the river of life and what that means for all of life. When scripture speaks of paradise, it tells us about a luscious city held safe and secure in the hands of G-d. Everything all around is bright and beautiful, green and alive. In this city, there is no darkness; there is no curse or sorrow. There is only the unimaginable light of Christ that sparks everything to life. And it is from here that the river of life flows. G-d, the source of life, calls us back to the wellspring when all is said and done.

All of our traveling and striving; all of our journeys of life bring us closer to G-d. As things change, as they always will whether we like it or not, we can take joy and comfort in knowing that every departure - even death – brings us one step closer to the G-d whose loving kindness knows no bounds. Hallelujah, amen.

At Trinity, we follow the Manna Principle, which asks us to have great faith that God will provide all that we need and also great faith in one another to share in the blessings each of us has been given. We do not ask for a tithe or a pledge but simply to give as you are able and as you feel led.

Our own Backpacks for Bixby program currently provides approximately 80 children in Bixby elementary schools with weekend meals. Backpacks 4 Bixby (B4B):

Our Backpacks 4 Bixby program just started our eighth school year delivering weekly food bags to 80+ children at four Bixby schools.

We started the program to fill a gap in our community. Elementary school children in need receive assisted lunches during the week but do not have that support during the weekend. So the Backpacks 4 Bixby program was started back in 2009 to help feed children on the weekends. The goal is to give them healthy food for breakfast & lunch on Sat. & Sun. every week during the school year.

We appreciate everyone that has signed up to deliver bags and there are still a few spots available to deliver on Thursdays. The sign up list is posted on the bulletin board outside the kitchen.

Donations of food are always welcome. Please continue to donate food items that are posted in your Sunday bulletins. Examples of items needed are:

1st Sunday - Peanut butter & Jelly 2nd Sunday - Tuna 3rd Sunday - Spaghetti/Ravioli 4th Sunday - Canned chicken

5th Sunday - Juice boxes, fruit cups, individually wrapped snack packs, small cereal boxes

Music Notes erik collins



We are very excited to welcome new friends and new pastors to Trinity! On September 10, the choir will begin the year with its annual fall social & dinner party at the Hanson's. This wonderful fellowship event allows us to reconnect and prepare for the start of the choir season.

Our music in worship for the month of September offers great variety. From upbeat gospel swing to reflective traditional English hymn meter, the choir always enjoys preparing a diverse repertoire that complements a well-rounded worship service.

River in Judea is a beautiful gospel-styled song, based on a secular text spun from the river-is-life metaphor, is perfect for virtually any presentation. The human's quest for moments of peace and inspiration translates into a riveting choral statement, and this setting conveys its message with great sincerity and eloquence.

Oftentimes I dream of music, of the river that freely flows. And it sings a song sweeter than honey, one everybody knows. Late at night, I hear it singing. Then again when I wake at dawn. And it fills me up with hope and goodwill, the will to go on, go on. There is a river in Judea that I heard of long ago. And it's a singing, ringing river that my soul cries out to know.

The word **Adiemus** means "We will draw near." The sound of *Adiemus* is generally identified with newage or Celtic music. Jenkins follows conventions of tonality up to a point—his harmony is derived from gospel and African music, decorated with functional dissonances such as suspensions and with greater freedom of movement between loosely related key areas. Karl Jenkins writes of his own work, "I conceived *Songs of Sanctuary* in the European classical tradition, but it was my intention that the vocal sound should be more akin to those heard in ethnic or world music."

Jesus Christ, the Apple Tree is a text that first appeared in an 18th century New Hampshire hymnal. This delightful gem is a favorite of English choirs and has been sung by the famous King's College Choir in many choral presentation. The text is more of a reflection than a sermon on the fall of man in the garden and its implications for our life today. Our redemption comes through the apple, which in this poem is the fruit of Jesus himself, the tree of life. One important 15th century English text says, "blessed be the time that apple taken was." This idea, along with the prominence of the apple in early American life, and the hallowed stories of Johnny Appleseed makes this variation on an English idea uniquely American.

The tree of life my soul hath seen, Laden with fruit and always green; The trees of nature fruitless be Compared with Christ, the apple tree.

His beauty doth all things excel: By faith I know, but ne'er can tell, The glory which I now can see In Jesus Christ, the apple tree.

For happiness I long have sought, And pleasure dearly I have bought; I missed of all but now I see, 'Tis found in Christ, the apple tree.

This fruit doth make my soul to thrive, It keeps my dying faith alive; Which makes my soul in haste to be With Jesus Christ, the apple tree.


